

The word Congress comes from the Latin, CON meaning together, and GRADI meaning, to walk, which when joined becomes 'to meet.' A congress is an act of coming together. We live in a world of cacophony, the loud, the harsh and the violent dominate our airwaves. They drown out the stories of the people and communities all around us - that are profound, tender, courageous.

Today, we are coming together to listen.

Collaborating with a cross-section of our diverse community, Congress is a citizens' assembly and a platform for people to have their say and be heard.

Congress connects the personal with the political by match making citizens with professional wordsmiths. Ten professional writers and ten community members have been invited to meet to work together to write and deliver the citizen's own first speech.

These writers and speakers have been curated by All The Queens Men, guided by principles of gender, cultural, geographic diversity, pandemographics and inclusivity. Together, these couples have created first speeches for those often unheard; public declarations that address personal visions for our collective future.

Established by Tristan Meecham and Bec Reid, they connect communities, artists and audiences together in events that transcend the everyday.
